- Met with each Iowa US Congressional office
- Organized and executed two child care center site visits with law makers
 - Active on-going partnership with the Iowa Child Care Coalition group

Iowa AEYC is part of the Iowa Child Care Coalition (ICCC). The Coalition, through nonpartisan legislative recommendations, seeks to increase access, affordability, and quality of child care while increasing the stability of the child care workforce across lowa.

2022 Priorities

- Identify a sustainable funding source for Child Care WAGE\$® Iowa and T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® Iowa statewide beyond SFY24.
- Increase the Child Care Assistance entrance income limits to 185% incrementally at 5% annually.
- Implement tax cuts and credits to: incentivize participation in the child care workforce: to incentivize businesses to increase investments in child care and to strengthen child care business.

Final Recommendations Developed by the Moving the Needle on Compensation Team

A small work group continued to meet throughout 2022 to work through implementation strategies for the identified goals.

Increase funding to adequately support and sustain statewide Child Care WAGE\$® lowa and T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood®

2022 Progress

Sustained funding for both programs will be critical to continue to grow and maintain quality educators.

 This goal is a priority on policy agendas for lowa's Child Care Coalition and is named specifically by the lowa Women's Foundation and United Way of Central lowa in their advocacy priorities.

Consider 'Early Care and Education' a high demand occupation Adding ECE to the high-demand occupation list will open funding opportunities to assist with the high cost of professionalizing the field as well as create market competition to drive salary increases.

 Discussions were held among legislators about creating a high demand occupation for ECE. Proposed legislation did not proceed.

As the workforce is recognized with competitive wages on par with similar occupations, more workers will be drawn into the sector and turnover will decrease as these earners move toward economic self-sufficiency.

- Discussions were held with Opportunities Exchange about how shared services could play a role in compensation.
- A 'Best Workplace Designation' was drafted and proposed to HHS. This designation would recognize and incentize program quality. It also requires implementation of a salary scale tied to NAEYC's Unifying Framework.
- Early Childhood Iowa in partnership with Iowa Quality For Kids (IQ4K) published an updated teaching roles career pathway that outlines how the Unifying Framework career designations align to Iowa's system.

By promoting higher education, T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood® lowa is helping to establish a well-qualified, fairly-compensated and stable workforce.

Child Care WAGE\$® lowa provides education-based financial stipends to those in the early care and education workforce in order to improve retention, compensation and education levels of those working with children ages birth to five years old. WAGE\$ works to support partnership and quality with sponsoring programs.
