



Legislative Recommendations

Iowa Child Care Coalition (ICCC)

lowa AEYC is part of the Iowa Child Care Coalition. ICCC was formed to more strategically address Iowa's child care crisis. The Coalition, through nonpartisan legislative recommendations, seeks to increase access, affordability, and quality of child care while increasing the stability of the child care workforce across Iowa.

2024 Legislative Recommendations

The 2024 ICCC policy priorities seek to expand on recommendations included in the Governor's Child Care Task Force Report and advance strategies implemented with federal funding from the ARPA Stabilization Grants.



Continue to allow child care providers to automatically qualify for Child Care Assistance (CCA).



Establish a child care workforce state matching grants program to fund innovative strategies that support the recommendations in the 2023 lowa Child Care Workforce Study.



Increase the CCA reimbursement rates to 75th percentile of the most recent market rate survey. Consider moving to cost of care information rather than market rate to inform CCA reimbursement rates.



Increase the CCA entrance income limit from 160% FPL to 185% FPL.



Increase the number of absence days allowed for CCA. Consider paying for enrollment rather than attendance.



Implement tax initiatives and strategies.

- State income tax exemptions for child care providers.
- · Address property tax valuation for child care centers to reduce overhead.

We also urge Iowa to sustain funding for intervention and prevention services for birth to 5 year-olds.




T.E.A.C.H. Outcomes



The T.E.A.C.H. Early Childhood[®] Iowa (Teacher Education And Compensation Helps) program is part of a comprehensive national strategy that provides teacher education and compensation to Iowans who work with children birth to five years old. By promoting higher education, T.E.A.C.H. is helping to establish a well-qualified, fairly-compensated, and stable workforce.

Through the right combination of economic and social support, T.E.A.C.H. helps early educators succeed. The program supports professional development of teachers, knowing that lowa's young children benefit with more highly qualified, diverse teachers who stay in their classrooms and in the field.




WAGE\$ Outcomes




A Program of Iowa Association for the Education of Young Children Child Care WAGE\$® lowa provides education-based financial stipends to those in the early care and education workforce in order to improve retention, compensation, and education levels of those working with children ages birth to five years old.


WAGE\$ is more than just a salary supplement; the program is a workforce initiative that positively influences the early childhood system. WAGE\$ serves as an incentive for staff at qualifying programs to consider increasing their education and for programs to take steps to increase their level of quality and/or begin serving children from low-income families.








satisfaction rate among participants and employers

ECQuIP Outcomes

Demographics Served

1,296 children birth to age five,

64% of which receive Child Care Assistance.

ECQuIP (Early Childhood Quality Improvement Project) supports 14 early childhood programs that serve at least 30% children from low-income families in Polk and Dallas counties.



Professional Development

We provided 62 hours of professional development for center staff on topics such as early childhood learning and development, classroom management, and social emotional development.



Screenings & Referrals

We facilitate various screenings and referrals, such as developmental, math, literacy, and social emotional. We also partner with EveryStep for health screenings and Dental Connections for dental screenings.



Center Support

We conducted 940 center visits, providing over 260 staff with support in curriculum, assessment, developmental screening, classroom management, and director consultation.

CDA® Navigator Outcomes

The Child Development Associate® (CDA) Credential™ is a recognized part of child care regulations in Iowa and across the country. The credential is based on a core set of competency standards and includes an assessment process. It is the best first step to earn more education in the early childhood field.



A Program of Iowa Association for the Education of Young Children

Our CDA Navigators work side-by-side with CDA candidates to support and facilitate the CDA process. They also build partnerships with community colleges and other training entities that provide education and training for the early childhood workforce. 2024 was their first full year of programming, and their results are amazing!








Event Attendance by County
